So you think you're a fast player?

With Matthew McManus' expressed consent to "spread the word" here are five issues you might wish to address as you play a session of bridge.

- 1. Are you ready to start? When asked to move to the next table are you still getting a cuppa, chatting or discussing the hand?
- 2. Do you travel light? Are you carrying unnecessary baggage?
- Do you play before doing bookwork? Get the game underway by leading or tabling dummy cards before recording whatever details you find necessary to record.
- 4. Does taking an average upset you? If you are not asked to "take an average" often then you generally are not at fault. Otherwise if it happens often then something needs to change for the benefit of other players.
- Do you track time? Always having to rush the last board suggests you are a slow player. It is good practice to pace yourself against the clock and play each hand comfortably.

Calling all Mentors

Transition to regular competitive sessions and initial exposure to experienced players can often be daunting for beginner players. Therefore, the Club is establishing a Mentoring Programme. Committee is seeking established players willing to act as mentors for beginners who have completed Wayne's lessons and have been attending supervised sessions. This way Committee hopes to facilitate a more stress-free transition of new "graduates" into one or more of the Club's competitive play sessions.

Mentors would be expected to play with one of the new players on at least four occasions [although not necessarily consecutive weeks] and thereby provide them with guidance and help build their confidence for competitive play. The mentor's commitment to the programme extends no further than the four sessions. If the mentor and beginner wish to continue their partnership beyond that, it is entirely their decision. However, mentors should bear in mind that there may be other beginners waiting in line to benefit from their generosity.

Mentors must be prepared to:

- play the basic Newcastle Standard System as taught by Wayne [system cards will be available];
- commit to four mentoring sessions with their assigned beginner;
- encourage the use of personal score sheets and analysing of hand records;
- spend time after each mentoring session discussing specific hands; and

 provide hints on bidding sequences (theirs and the opposition's), on leads and lines of play.

There will always be new players needing assistance and any time that you can volunteer as a mentor whether for a single four-session programme or for several times throughout a year, it will be of benefit not only to the beginner but to the ongoing success of the Club.

Table Fee Slips

Ken Wilks has kindly submitted the following two articles to help members understand what happens behind the scenes.

Would all members please take care in completing the Table Fee Slips. When the slips are competed correctly the process of counting and reconciling table fees requires no guesswork and can proceed much more effectively.

The significance for each entry may be explained as:

Table No: identification to which the slip applies; **Date:** table fees are reconciled by date;

Session: circle the time of the session. This is

especially important for Monday when there is a PM session and an EVENING

session:

1/2 Table: to confirm that there should only be

two fees at the table and to nullify the need to check if any fees are missing;

Director to confirm that there should be one

/Dealer: less fee at the table;

No. of the number of visitors at the table is **Visitors:** important as the information is

recorded in the reconciliation and

visitors pay extra;

Tokens: enter the number of tokens – not the

dollar value of those tokens, and count the tokens to confirm that they have

all been collected;

Cash: Enter the total cash paid to confirm

that the correct fees have been paid;

and most importantly

Plastic take the time to seal the plastic bags

Bags: to prevent cash or tokens from falling

out.

Master Points

Master points are won by playing in club events or congresses. There are three types of master points that a player can win.

- Green Points won at club events
- Red Points won at special club events and congresses
- Gold Points won at special ABF events such as the GNOTs, Gold Coast Congress, ANC etc

Masterpoints won by players over their lifetime are used to determine each player's master ranking. There are currently 21 different ranks ranging from Graduate Master to Diamond Grand Master. Players receive an official certificate with each rank promotion. Master rankings may be used to determine seedings in tournaments.

Master points won at congresses are updated on a monthly basis. Master points won at club level are updated on a quarterly basis at which time new master point ranking lists are produced and distributed to all clubs.



The screen that appears lists full details of the players ranking. Name; ABF Number; Home Club; Rank; Requirements for the next promotion; Green, red, gold and total master points won; and A list of all Masterpoints won for the last 12 months. That list enables players to check the green, red and gold master points that they have won at:

- any clubs they have played;
- any congresses they have played; and
- any special events they have played in such as country teams, GNOTs, etc

There is a wealth of detailed information available to players about their master points. If players have any queries about their master points, they should check the on line system before contacting the masterpoint secretary.
