## **ASK THE EXPERTS**

<u>1 When counting up your points at the beginning of a hand – how do you treat a singleton king, queen or Jack? Do you take some notice of them or none at all?</u>





## **Chris Dibley**

Singleton Ks are generally counted **initially** as 1 hcp less (ditto Qx/Jx).

As the bidding progresses, players should re-evaluate their hands in light of more information.

e.g., dealer has Qx, xx, AKJx, xxxxx = worth 9 initially, no great shape or easy rebid if you open 1C, so Pass.

Partner opens 1♠ (5), you bid 1NT, partner bids 2♠ (6+, 10-15 HCP)

**In pairs**, I would **invite** with 3♠ ("never push too hard for game in pairs"),

but **in teams** given my ♠Qx is now **full value**, plus **quick tricks in ♦** and maybe ruffing value in ♥, I would **bid 4**♠.

2. You are about to defend a NT contract by the opposition and during the bidding your partner had bid a suit. The NT came after that bid obviously indicating cover.

You are on lead – Do you still lead your partner's suit?





Unless you have a **VERY** good reason not to (side suit KQJxx plus side entry and shortage with partner's suit), it's **usually better to build partnership trust** and lead partner's suit.

Leads xxx if not supported in the bidding

xxx if supported in the bidding

Advanced exception: if opposition have bid slowly (maybe only 24-25 HCP for 3NT)

and not shown a long side suit to run (two flat hands),

and you have, say Axx in partner's suit (maybe over opps K),

then Axx may give declarer the needed trick for the contract.
